AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 70 OF THE ORDINANCES OF THE VILIOF RED JACKET, SAID ORDINANCE BEING ENTITLED: "AN ORDINANCE TO DEFINE, REGULATE, LICENSE OR TO SUPPRESS PUBLIC BILLIARD, POOL ROOMS, PUBLIC DARK HALLS, BALL LILEYS AND SOFT DRINK EMPORIUMS AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF SAME".

THE VILLAGE OF RED JACKET ORDAINS:

Section I. That the said ordinance No. 70 of the Ordinance of the village of Red Jacket be amended in the following particulars:

(1) That Section 3 of said ordinance be amended to read as follows:

Section 3. - Immediately upon the filing of any such application, the Village Clerk shall deliver a copy thereof to the Village Marshal, who shall forthwith make an inspection of the location or place where it is proposed to keep such billiard room ball alley, public dance hall or soft drink emporium, and make an investigation of the character, habits and morals of the applicant, who shall, after such inspection and investigation, seturn said copy of the application to the said Clerk with his recommendation. If the Common Council shall approve said application, it should then be the duty of the Village Clerk, u on the payment to him by said applicant of the sum of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars as an annual license fee, to issue to such applicant a license in conformity with the application, which said license shall be given a distinct serial number.

(2) That there be added as Section 11 of said ordinance a new section to be known as Section 11(a) to read as follows:

Section 11(a). - Any person or persons who shall have been three times convicted in court of competent jurisdiction of violating any of the rovisions of this ordinance shall forthwith have his or its license remoked and he or it shall thereafter be refused a further license to conduct any business under this ordinance for a period of rive years from and after the date of said third conviction.

Section II. These amendments shall take effect and be in force from and after twenty (20) days from the date hercof.
